

## Children's Programming


**Baby Laptime will be offered two times a week** in order to keep the small group size that is essential for families to learn and have fun with language play. **A 10:00 session will be offered on Wednesdays and a 10:15 on Friday mornings.** Baby Laptime is an early literacy program designed for children birth to 24 months.



A second Story Time Plus session has been added for mid April – June on Wednesday mornings at 10:45 for children ages 3-5 years. Registration is required for this 8 week session. This story time will springboard from a picture book that lends itself to a dis-

cussion of a math or science concept into an accompanying activity that explores the concept.

We all use processes and skills of science and math every day because they are actions that help us explore the world in a meaningful way – to make sense of it. Children need to ask questions, have discussions, explore using a variety of materials, collect data and talk about what they are doing. This program will promote those activities.



In addition, the skills and processes that will be featured in our program here at the library are all based on the state standards
